Several internal plumbing repairs included a new restroom faucet, kitchen faucet repair, and new outside frost-proof faucet. We have made a plan to increase the size of our parking lot.

As always, we look forward to helping people look for historic information. Martin Witte, LTHS President


Condolences



Letter from Barbara Banyai Ciabattoni April 2021

It just seems like yesterday that I lived in a beautiful quaint little village of Limerick. I was born in a house on Ridge Pike beside the original Limerick Chapel and across from the old Limerick Hotel in 1938. My parents were Julius and Gertie (Lightcap) Banyai and I had 3 sisters and two brothers: Charlotte, Laura, Carol, Julius and Richard.

We attended St. James Evangelical and Reformed Church (now United Church of Christ).

I know Limerick has changed drastically since then, but I will always have the little village with friendly people in my heart.

We attended Washington Elementary School (which I understand is now gone) with no running water, but it will always be my favorite school. Mr. Hess was the principal, and I have fond memories of Miss Ash. We had to clean our school every Friday. I guess kids nowadays would not believe that.

We lived a very frugal life because of the depression and World War II, but we were never hungry.

We appreciated what we received for Christmas, which was fruit and nuts and hard candy in our stockings.


I remember a gift I got when I was about 7 years old. It was a doll with brown eyes like me. I was the only child of 6 with brown eyes like my Father. My parents told me it was difficult to find a doll with brown eyes because most dolls had blue eyes.



Where the years went, I do not know. I left my doll at my parents' home when I left; but years later when they re-located to Collegeville they asked me if I wanted my doll. I of course said yes but what happened to her shocked me. I guess my younger sister and her friends played with her. For many years I tried to find a doll hospital with no success; then I just forgot about it.

Now that I am 82, I look at her and everyone said she looked scary and decided to search again. Having the internet has made a difference. I began searching on the internet in December 2020 after my 82nd birthday. I found one and corresponded with her. It is The Village Doll Hospital in Blue Ball, PA. I told her the condition of the doll was terrible, but she told me not to be embarrassed. I sent her pictures of it and was told it could be repaired; so off she went to Blue Ball, PA via USPS. I received her about 6 or 8 weeks later. I asked if she had a dress for an 8-inch doll I found in the gutter in Royersford when I was walking my dogs, and was put with my old doll as her "baby."

Pleasant memories come back when I look at her like she used to look from my hometown "Limerick."
